There is a scene in the second radio series of Douglas Adams' Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy in which a boy is learning (remotely, via computer - Adams' technology was so often ahead of his time) about the history of the planet Brontitall. Each time he gets a question correct, the computer rewards the boy by allowing him to push a button. I have recently discovered a similar instant gratification for myself by learning German using Duolingo. I send half an hour or so on this app first thing each morning, before my lessons, and it instantly sets me up for the day ahead. The pinging sound it makes when I get a question right is an instant reward and I begin the day by feeling as though I have already achieved something. Do not underestimate how far these little triumphs can go to give our lives structure and purpose at the moment.

Meanwhile, a debate rages in certain corners of social media between people with lists of stuff to achieve in lockdown and those who say that the most important thing now is to look after your own well-being and not feel guilty if you haven't written six novels by lunchtime. Both approaches are valid, but I am certainly relishing this chance to learn new things and in greater depth than I would normally have the time to do. Rarely, though, do I have the chance to explore these facts, picked up in my day-to-day life, in any great detail. Now, I find myself learning a new language and it reminds me of how much I enjoy learning new things. "THE LAST WORD", WITH THIS EDITION'S SCHOLAR... This edition, two scholars offer their opinions on the new year 11 curriculum.

Rosy: We are all aware that the current situation with Covid-19 has caused some unprecedented changes to the educational system, with the cessation of all public exams. Unfortunately it has meant that people like me are now confused on what we should doing in lessons. However, over the holidays, the senior management team devised a plan for year 11s during lockdown. Instead of spending the rest of the term working on the GCSE curriculum, which would not count towards our final grade, we have now been set multiple new challenges to expand our knowledge in order to be ready for A levels. Every fortnight, we will have 6 periods of each A Level subject we have already chosen. For me, I have lessons in Biology, Chemistry



and Latin and this is so that I am ready for the jump to A Levels next year. So far, the lessons have been introductions into the new syllabuses and it is also a very good time to see if these subjects are exactly what we want to do. I think this is very important as it can prevent students for changing their subjects when we are already into year 12, giving more time for focused learning. We have been given the opportunity to do an HPQ, spend time creating in the Quarantine Zone and learn a new skill. I am really excited to do the HPQ as it is a great way not only to be introduced to in-depth research, but also to develop key aspects of planning, note taking and organisation. I am doing my HPQ on the topic of psychology because I am very interested in the subject but I was not able to take it as an A Level. I hope that doing this as a HPQ will give me the opportunity to find out about psychology beyond A Level. In addition, there are newer lesson topics, about learning new skills and how to keep occupied during quarantine. There were a range of new skills to learn, including; cooking, coding, conversational Spanish, ancient Greek and creating a magazine. I decided to help create the year 11 magazine and I am spending the next six weeks writing, editing and publishing articles. I have really got stuck into this task and I have really enjoyed venturing out of my comfort zone. I think that, in this difficult time, it has been very useful to have lessons which are not ones that have been repeated for the past two years, but ones where we can have fun learning for our future. In my opinion, the new curriculum has helped to expand my ideas for what I want to do in Sixth Form and has been very efficient in balancing school life and home life.

Archie: Following the cancellation of the summer exams, we have been set a new curriculum based on our A Level choices. So far it has been great as I feel that we have been given the chance to properly prepare for the next two years in Sixth Form and get a small head start on the workload. We have also been given extra slots for an elective new skill, an HPQ and subject-based projects. For the elective, I chose astronomy, which is something I was always interested in but never had the opportunity to learn, so this is a great time to do so. The HPQ allows you to research any subject area you like as well as develop critical research skills such as note taking, time management and researching which will all be very useful for Sixth Form and beyond. I've decided to research the effect of the new F-35 aircraft on the UK as I would like a career in aerial combat either as a pilot or an engineer. At the moment we are creating a Dragon's Den style product for our age demographic during the Quarantine Zone; this is a fun and interesting insight into a subject that we would not always have the chance to study. This has definitely been a challenging time learning wise. However I think that it will benefit us as we can become more practiced at learning at home similarly to revision, as well as utilize the technology we already have in place to a better degree.
