A LEVEL LANGUAGES WITH AQA (FRENCH, GERMAN & SPANISH)

The core content of the new A Level in French, German and Spanish is as follows:

- Social issues and trends
- Political and artistic culture
- Grammar

There is also the option to study literary texts and films, which will be done in all three languages.

The new A Level is a linear two-year course consisting of three papers, all examined at the end of the second year of study:



PAPER 1: LISTENING, READING & WRITING (50%)

Content

- Listening comprehension assessed in the target language
- Reading comprehension assessed in the target language
- Translation into English (a passage of minimum 100 words)
- Translation into the target language (a passage of minimum 100 words)

Notes

- Written terminal examination (end of the second year)
- No access to a dictionary during the assessment



PAPER 2: WRITING (20%)

Content

- Either one short essay in the target language on a set text from a choice of two questions and one short essay in the target language on a set film from a choice of two questions
- Or two short essays in the target language on set texts from a choice of two questions on each text

Notes

- No access to text or film during the assessment
- No access to a dictionary during the assessment

PAPER 3: SPEAKING (30%)

Content

- Discussion of a sub-theme (see broad topic areas above) with the discussion based on a stimulus card which may be studied by the pupil for five minutes prior to the start of the test
- Presentation and discussion of individual research project (prepared over the course of the two years)

Notes

- Spoken terminal examination (towards the end of the second year)
- Internally assessed and externally marked
- No access to a dictionary during the assessment (stimulus card preparation time)
